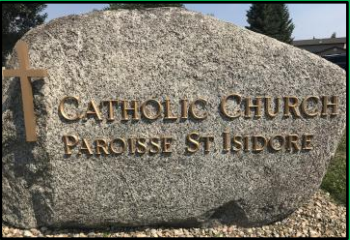

Month of the Holy Rosary



The month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. According to an account by fifteenth-century Dominican, Alan de la Roch, Mary appeared to St. Dominic in 1206 after he had been praying and doing severe penances because of his lack of success in combating the Albigensian heresy. Mary praised him for his valiant fight against the heretics and then gave him the Rosary as a mighty weapon, explained its uses and efficacy, and told him to preach it to others.

Until about the 15th century hundreds of mysteries were part of the Rosary devotion then the 15 mysteries that we know today were definitively fixed as "the Mysteries of the Rosary." Pope John Paul II, in his encyclical, *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, in 2002 added the five Luminous Mysteries.

Through the meditations of the complete Rosary one recalls and has impressed on his mind, the Popes tell us, "the chief mysteries of the Christian religion," "the mysteries of our Redemption," "the great mysteries of Jesus and His Mother united in joys, sorrows, and triumphs." The twenty mysteries are divided into four equal groups, known as "The Joyful," "The Sorrowful," "The Glorious," and "The Luminous Mysteries."

Canadian Thanksgiving Facts & Trivia

Canadian Thanksgiving is always celebrated on the second Monday in October, earlier than the American Thanksgiving, which is held in November. Since 1971 it has coincided with Columbus Day in the U.S.

Thanksgiving is a statutory holiday in Canada, except in PEI, Newfoundland and Labrador, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Although Thanksgiving falls on a Monday, many have their dinner and family get-togethers on the Sunday.

While it is widely believed eating turkey makes you sleepy, many experts believe it is actually the carbohydrates that are part of the Thanksgiving meal that causes you to feel tired.

There are 80 cranberry farms in B.C. with many destined for the Thanksgiving table, and while it is doubtful cranberries were served at the first Thanksgiving meals, the indigenous people used them for cooking and dyeing and introduced them to the pilgrims.

Feast Day of St. Therese



The Feast Day of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, our parish Patron Saint, is October 1. St Thérèse of Lisieux (1873 - 1897) was a French nun who died at the age of 24 of tuberculosis. She grew up in a very devout family, experienced "the Virgin of the Smile" during an illness, was converted at the age of 14, took a pilgrimage to Rome, and then entered the monastery in Lisieux, Carmel. She was known for her devotion to God, her plays and poems, and her battle with tuberculosis. As a teacher of the "Little Way," she was a pioneer of everyday spirituality as a path of faith in action. Happy Feast Day to all St. Theresa's parishioners!
